Mountain lions eat mostly small animals, such as rabbits. <span style="float: right;">A</span>	The fossil tooth was found in sandstone, which is a sedimentary rock made of layers. <span style="float: right;">B</span>
The fossil tooth is sharp. <span style="float: right;">C</span>	The fossil tooth is much flatter than a mountain lion’s tooth. <span style="float: right;">D</span>
Mountain lions have side teeth that are between 3 and 5 centimeters long. <span style="float: right;">E</span>	The fossil tooth was found in the mountains of Utah, an area where mountain lions live now. <span style="float: right;">F</span>
Mountain lions have sharp teeth. <span style="float: right;">G</span>	The fossil tooth is 5 centimeters long. <span style="float: right;">H</span>
